Dear Friends at All Saints',

The Greek philosopher Plato, in his famed *Allegory of the Cave* describes the life of some prisoners who are chained in a dungeon through an opening of which some light enters their dark abode. All they can see are the shadows of people and objects cast upon their prison wall. When one of their inmates manages to free himself and experiences the world of real sounds and smells and colors and light he returns to set his fellows free. But they refuse, preferring instead the accustomed comfort of a make-belief world which they, knowing no better, take to be the real one. Ignorance is bliss!

On February 2nd, the groundhog is supposed to come out of its hibernation and look for the sunlight. But if it sees sunlight and its shadow it will withdraw and hide for another six weeks, announcing the continuation of winter. If the skies are cloudy and rainy, it may venture forth. Popular weather wisdom!

Much talk is there today about enlightenment: Asian religions stress man's ability to reach deep within and overcome darkness with the light of insight and reason. The scientific approach appeals to us moderns: the encouragement to come out of our caves to see the light and/or to go back if we don't.

The church, on February 2nd, celebrates the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple (Luke 2: 22-40), also called the Purification of Mary, or Candlemas (since this feast falls on a Monday this year, we'll move it to Sunday, February 8). Forty days after giving birth to Jesus, Mary, according to custom (Lev. 12:2-8) presents her son at the temple in Jerusalem where two old people have been waiting for "enlightenment": Simeon and Anna. It is now that Simeon formulates the famous words of the *Nunc Dimittis*: "Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word; for mine eyes have seen thy salvation which thou hast prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to thy people Israel."



It's not the light of unaided reason or meditation; it's a light that shines from without, bringing hope and meaning to our somber existence. The painting by Charles le Brun (1645) places the bright Christ child in the midst of dark colors, with someone on the

left holding a candelabra: He is THE light! On this day, for hundreds of years, all candles for use in the church were blessed by the priest (hence the name "Candlemas"). In the days of electricity and "liquid candles" it may be difficult to understand this symbolism. But the church continues to proclaim HIM in whose light we live and move and have our being. May we all come out of our caves and see this light in which there is no shadow or darkness at all.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR SENIOR WARDEN...

Last month I talked about "Religion". If we're going to get serious about our common religious understanding and develop programs here at All Saints' consistent with our spiritual nature everyone must have a common understanding. First, the **concept or idea**, Secondly, the **actions**, and Finally, the **reason why** has to be fully understood by everyone. I started off in January talking about my concept or idea of religion. In this article, I'll focus on actions (not specific programs). Next month, I'll conclude this three part series with the specific guidelines given by Jesus and the why and reason for active religion at All Saints' from my perspective.

Remember, my concept of religion came from the Gospel according to Saint John. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God and the Word was God. And the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us full of Grace and Truth. For the law was given by Moses, but Grace and Truth came by Jesus Christ."

So now it's time to talk about action. I believe what we need to do specifically at All Saints' can be best understood if we first look at some words we hear every Sunday during Eucharist. "Holy and gracious Father: In your love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all."

From this reading I personally identify three entities. **Me, You, and God**. From this reading it sounds like God reconciled You and Me to Him and now we are **all** Square. To me this fall and reconciliation seems to be inconsistent with my concept of religion and the words from Saint John above where the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us. If God is truly the one and only God of the Universe, it wouldn't be necessary for Him to do this reconciliation at all. I believe, He is certainly smart enough and that He is all knowing. He would have known it when He created us and to set us up for this notorious fall so he could do something like sacrifice a son to get us back even with him doesn't seem Godly to me. So for me, there has to be a hidden meaning in these words we hear every Sunday. That hidden meaning calls us to action and will direct us in preparing programs and ministry.

Let me say it this way. Visualize three entities (God, You, and Me) and the three rela-

tionships between God, You and Me. Get a piece of paper and draw this visualization as an equilateral triangle with God as the point on the top. Draw You as the point on the right and then Me as the point on the left. Then connect the points with lines that have arrows. The two lines from You and Me that connect to God should have an arrow pointing upward toward God. The line that connects Me with You should have two arrows pointing to each of us.

Now, I would like for you to think about all the things (actions) you do in your life and more specifically those things you do at All Saints' that move your point on your triangle closer to God. I'll do the same thing. As you can see, as each of us develop our spiritual nature and dwell in our human nature (as Jesus did) closer to God our own human relationship between the two of us becomes closer automatically. Likewise, when we reconcile with each other those actions also draw us closer to God as we develop a closer relationship.

The concept or idea of my religion can be so simple if we're all moving toward the same point. I believe God sent Jesus to live and dwell amongst us to model the type of Christian life we need to live. If God's reconciliation act we read about each Sunday from the prayer book is all there is, I'm puzzled as to why Jesus dwelt among us. I think reconciliation can continue to happen as You and I move together toward God. He didn't have to sacrifice His son to square us with Him. Our Acceptance of His Grace and Truth in Jesus Christ is all we need. Our actions should be like those of Jesus who dwelt amongst us. That's what supports and sustains my "Good Ole Religion" concept.

The Gospel of Saint John goes on to say, "But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name." The blessings we all receive are so numerous and it's up to us to truly live up to being a son of God. I do believe we can live up to this model because we've been given a specific instructions manual. I also believe you will have to wait until next month to read Why I think we can collectively receive Jesus Christ and how to participate in His Grace as a son of God here at All Saints' Church.

It is the season of light, the revelation of Jesus Christ as the light of the world. **The month of February marks the final days of the Season after Epiphany.** On February 8th we will remember Simeon in the temple as he proclaims Jesus as a light to the Gentiles and the glory of the people Israel. Hence, at the 10:30 am service we will celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord Jesus Christ in the Temple. At this service all gifts given to Parish will be blessed; also, the donators and/or benefactors of these gifts will also be recognized and prayers given for their generosity. Therefore, come all so that we may share in and give thanks for these gifts.

February 25th is the first day of Lent—*Dies cinerum*, the day of the ashes and the service will be held at 7:00 pm. The ashes that we receive are a symbol of penance that are to humble our hearts, helping us to develop a spirit of humility and sacrifice, but ultimately reminding us that this life on Earth will come to pass. The Season of Lent is a time of preparation and reflection, penitence and fasting. **To support us through the Lenten Season that may at time seem somber we will have our annual Lenten program and Stations of the Cross. Stations of the Cross will begin Friday, February 27th at 12:00 noon and the Lenten program will begin Sunday, March 1st, this year’s topic for discussion is “The Beatitudes”. The soup supper will begin at 6:00 pm, followed by evensong at 6:30 pm and the Lenten program at 7:00 pm.**

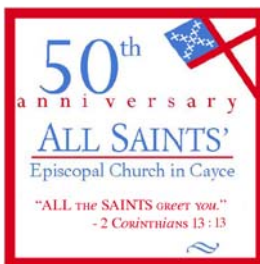

DEDICATION OF THE CRÈCHE ...

On February 8th at the Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord Jesus Christ in the Temple the crèche will be presented for blessing. The beautiful hand carved set is made of Madeira—the native mahogany of the Bahamas. The Madeira pieces include Joseph, Mary with Jesus in arms, two shepherds, three wise men and two angels with coconut husk wings, decoratively finished with coconut plait. The ox, ass, sheep and camel are made of American mahogany, and provide wonderful contrast with their deep red colour to soft complexion of the Madeira. In the background you will find a Cyprus star that lead the wise men to the manger. The Crèche will be on display at the 8:00 am and 10:30 am services for all to see.

The artist: the crèche was hand made by Mrs. Celestine Albury whom is an educator by profession, but has enjoyed the art of woodcraft from her teenage years. Though not her fulltime profession, her woodcraft has been recognized and received high honours by the Ministry of Tourism as she is Cacique award recipient and her wholesale products grace the shelves of many local stores. At this time on behalf of Mrs. Albury and her family, I would like to say thank you for the opportunity to create such a symbolic piece of art and we hope that the Parish will enjoy this piece for years to come. A card will be provided in the Narthex after the 8:00 am service and passed around during coffee hour after the 10:30 am service for all parishioners to sign, to give thanks to Mrs. Albury for her work.

CHRISTIAN FORMATION...

SUNDAY LECTURE SERIES: DOWN TO EARTH

We begin our creed by affirming faith in God, the maker of heaven and earth. There are many Christians who feel genuinely threatened by the theory of evolution and applaud efforts to teach our children the theory of creationism. But then there is this huge disconnect: environmentalists are derided as “tree-huggers”, anti-business, blue-eyed liberal wackos. Talking about climate change, stewardship of the earth, “wise-use” issues: that's politics and should be kept out of the church (we generally don't discuss anything that could be viewed from more than one angle!)

That Christianity is understood, by so many, as the perfect way for the soul to reach heaven, must easily be one of the greatest theological capers of all time. Human behavior has an enormous impact on the abundant life of all living things. Earth-use issues have an enormously important spiritual dimension. In February we shall devote some serious thinking time to the role the earth plays in our faith as it is expressed in the Old and New Testaments.

BIBLE STUDY: THE GOSPEL OF MARK

Much of our faith is “sung” rather than spoken and professed. This series deals with a hymn, selected by our choirmaster, a hymn which will be sung the following Sunday. We shall look at the lyrics, the life and impact of poet and composer, as well as the theology of the piece.

Every class stands on its own: you can miss a few and still re-connect; you can join in without ever having attended. We meet every Wednesday from 6-7, quite convenient for those who come from work and exchange the local news for an exciting time of growing in faith.

As the Episcopal Relief and Development project for All Saints', we want to buy a cow! Your gift of a cow will help transform malnourished families into strong, healthy members of their communities in countries where there is extreme poverty. You will help them earn a living—families can sell surplus milk in the marketplace, enabling them to send their children to school as well as purchase essential medicines and clothing.

The cost of one cow is \$550. We want to raise this money during February and March so that we can send the money to Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD) by ERD Sunday at the end of March. If each family gives a few dollars each week, we'll reach this goal. Please mark ERD on the "For" line of your check and place it in the offering plate. Also, there will be a basket in the parish hall during Sunday School and the coffee hour to receive your donations. The children and youth are planning something special to raise money for this. Our Episcopal Church Women are giving \$150 from bazaar proceeds to fund a Micro-Credit Loan for a woman to start a small business. Men? Others? If we raise extra money, maybe we can do a flock of chickens for \$135 or a pig for \$100.

Episcopal Relief and Development works in partnership with the worldwide church, ecumenical agencies and local organizations in more than 40 countries, reaching close to 2.5 million people in need. Since we aren't including our financial information in the newsletter we will post our Financial summary on the Vestry bulletin board in the parish hall. A couple of Stewardship updates are below:

- ◆ Financially we finished 2008 plus \$27 for the year.
- ◆ 2008 annual contribution statements (for tax returns) were mailed in January.
- ◆ Contribution envelopes for 2009 were distributed during January.
- ◆ Pledges were collected for 2009, and about 60% of our planned budget was pledged.
- ◆ Pledges and donations were collected for the 50th Anniversary/Stained Glass Window. 88% of budget was pledged.

Remember one-half of your pledge is needed by March, so the 2nd of 3 payments can be sent for the stained glass window.
